A bit of data crunching from the above table (24 walkthrough visits up to and including 17.02.21) ...

- 17 Species sighted. Usually between 14 and 20 species have been sighted during most walk-throughs. September 12, 2020 was a big day with 23 species (on May 28, 2020 only 12 were sighted nature can be fickle...)
- 3 species have been seen at each walk-through: Blackbird, Tui & Fantail (Chaffinches and Grey Warblers have been off shopping during separate visits, otherwise they would be in this exclusive group too, Silvereyes have not been seen twice)
- 12 species were sighted during at least 67% (16 or more) of visits: Bellbird, Blackbird, Chaffinch, Fantail, Grey Warbler, Magpie, Paradise Shelduck, Pukeko, Silvereye, Sparrow, Thrush & Tui
- Most sighted (Top 7 in alphabetical order): Blackbird (203), Chaffinch (189), Fantail (150), Goldfinch (113), Silvereyes (200), Sparrow (111), Tui (174).
- Least sighted in this series of reports (in alphabetical order, how often sighted, total number): Dunnock (3, 3), Falcon (2, 3), Mallard (3, 5), Redpoll (3, 7), Shining Cuckoo (2, 3), White Faced Heron (2, 3), Rock Pigeon (0, 0)

February 17, 2021

Helen Reports: Today (Feb 17, 2021) was a pleasant contrast to the previous day or two, so a good chance to get along to do my bird observations. The cool southerly wind had disappeared and the sun was out.

My first encounter was with the California Quail family at the entrance - they are so comical. The pukekos seem to have taken up residence in the picnic area.

Otherwise it was all rather quiet - I saw 19 species but only counted 73 birds (*Ed: a bit below average of 83*). My route was along the bush track parallel with the farm race, then to the Hub and up the Ti Kouka track beside the Matai Bush (very quiet), across to the Ramaroa Stream, down to the Kahikitea and Milk trees, then back along the Ramaroa track.

All very lovely and I never cease to be amazed at the rampant growth of the new bush along the Ramaroa Stream.

I am sure there will soon be many more birds found there. I noticed that the #1 bird count site has come out of its hole in the ground - so much has changed there now with all the trees taking over the original grassland, so maybe it has passed it's use-by date?

The most wonderful thing today was watching a shining cuckoo chick being fed by it's foster parent, greywarbler!! I suspect there was more than one - on the Ramaroa track leading from the kahikitea, on my way out. I spent quite a while watching them, very close at hand.

A very pleasant and rewarding day!!
