First to get my attention was the song thrush,






a pukeko sitting high up in a ngaio (!)

The undergrowth looked good, hence the pic of the nikau with its new frond - and many kohekohe and titoki seedlings.

## Data Table – some analysis

A bit of data crunching from the attached table (36 walkthrough visits up to and including 21.6.22)

Usually between 14 and 20 species have been sighted during most walk-throughs. September 12, 2020 was a big day with 23 species, on May 28, 2020 & May 23, 2022, only 12 were recorded.

Helen records on average, a total number of 80 birds per walkthrough (the average has ranged from 54 to 130).

• On June 21, 2022: 15 species & 123 birds recorded (seen or heard).

• 3 species have been seen during every walk-through: Blackbird, Tui & Fantail (Grey Warblers have not been seen once during separate visits, otherwise they would be in this exclusive group too)

• 14 species were sighted during at least 63% (22 or more) of visits: Bellbird, Blackbird, Chaffinch, Eastern Rosella, Fantail, Grey Warbler, Magpie, Paradise Shelduck, Pukeko, Silvereye, Sparrow, Starling, Thrush & Tui (falling out of the list this time are: kereru with 21 sightings, back in are Starling with 22)

• Most sighted / Top 8 in alphabetical order: Blackbird (280), Chaffinch (248), Fantail (240), Goldfinch (172), Pukeko (173), Silvereyes (283), Starling (188), Tui (287)

• Least sighted in this series of reports (in alphabetical order, how often sighted, total number): Dunnock (3, 3), Falcon (2, 3), Mallard (3, 5), Redpoll (3, 7), Rock Pigeon (0, 0), Shining Cuckoo (4, 7), White Faced Heron (2, 3)
