
Bird Count Walkthrough September 16, 2022

A lovely spring day today so a chance to make the most of it with the September Bird `Walkthrough'

There was a noticeable increase in bird activity along the Ramaroa wetland track - mostly chaffinches and fantails. So good to see. I saw a sheep in there too, which wasn't quite so good!

It was also rather special to see 5 kereru. The first was near the entrance - I haven't seen them here before. The others were seen near the Hub.

The area around the Dell and beyond was looking splendid. I was sad to see the totara fallen (on the slope to the north – see Ann's comment below) and the kowhais that Tony and I planted so long ago looking a bit forlorn.

17 Species and 97 birds counted - so a great day was had!

That totara (see Helen's comment above) blew over a few weeks ago. I have since done some pruning to try and support your kowhai. The best of Tony's kowhai are those below the Hub toilets, creeping thro the flax and down the hill. Some impressive trees coming along.

I was sad to see one of the two swamp maire (Syzygium maire) in the Dell had split. When I investigated, it had a double leader and a whole lot of aerial roots had grown down into the trunk.



I then looked at the other one and that also has a double



leader and the same thing is happening with a split forming.. There were little roots popping out through the bark randomly as well as from roots running along the ground. I will have to plant some more and make sure they do not have double leaders!

I also planted 3 small kamahi trees behind the Kamahi Bush sign so that people can see what they look like in years to come.

Data Table – some analysis

.

A bit of data crunching from the attached table (39 walkthrough visits up to and including 16.9.22)

Usually between 12 and 20 species have been sighted during most walk-throughs. September 12, 2020 was a big day with 23 species, on May 28, 2020, May 23, 2022 & July 14, 2022 only 12 were recorded.

Helen records on average, a total number of 80 birds per walkthrough (the range is 37 to 130).

- On Sept 16, 2022: 17 species & 97 birds recorded (seen or heard).
- 3 species have been recorded during every walk-through: Blackbird, Tui & Fantail (Grey Warblers have not been seen once during separate visits, otherwise they would be in this exclusive group too)
- 12 species were sighted/heard during at least 66% (25 or more) of visits: Bellbird, Blackbird, Chaffinch, Eastern Rosella, Fantail, Grey Warbler, Magpie, Paradise Shelduck, Pukeko, Silvereye, Thrush & Tui
- Most recorded / Top 8 in alphabetical order: Blackbird (306), Chaffinch (273), Fantail (257), Goldfinch (172), Pukeko (191), Silvereyes (287), Starling (192), Tui (305)
- Least sighted in this series of reports (in alphabetical order, how often sighted, total number): Dunnock (3, 3), Falcon (2, 3), Mallard (4, 7), Redpoll (3, 7), Rock Pigeon (0, 0), Shining Cuckoo (4, 7), White Faced Heron (2, 3)
