At Ramaroa Wetland

Releasing this year's and last year's plants and chipping away at gorse plants and grubbing thistles. Also looking at possible routes for a Ramaroa Wetland Track to connect the Marines' Reservoir to the Ramaroa Stream.

Donation from Kapiti Pakeke Lions Club.

Theo and Sandra attended an evening with the Kapiti Pakeke Lions along with other recipients of grants. We were privileged to receive a donation of \$1,750. This will be used to erect another information sign, about native lizards, to go next to the bird sign by the caravan at the Hub *Many thanks to the club.*

Bad things

Burglary at the Shed. Mower Kermit was stolen, along with various tools and pest control gear. If anyone sees Kermit let us or the police know.

Wall demolition. Apparently an intoxicated driver took out this big chunk. At least he did not hit another vehicle. We are gutted as hundreds of volunteer hours went into building the wall in 2011, led by Sascha Wassong.







It will be a huge job to repair it. The Trust will explore options.

Good things

Upper Ti Kouka Stream Fencing. Materials have been placed and work is expected to start in a couple of weeks. We have begun planning planting options. Gorse is establishing on the slopes and we will use this as part of the restoration programme with perimeter plantings. An application for plant funding has been submitted.

Lizards at Whareroa Project. A small group has met to determine how best to proceed with establishing a lizard friendly zone at Whareroa. This would involve planting, monitoring and trapping. Whareroa may be suitable to establish a "relocation refuge" for lizards displaced by development or roading projects. This would involve very intensive pest control.

LUV Training More volunteers successfully completed their 2nd day of LUV training – well done Liffet Stewart, lan Redward, Shane Cave and Jason Bohmer. We now have a good complement of drivers. It is so useful to transport tools and equipment such as spraying gear and weed-eaters.

DOC's Tracks have been beautifully mown. Thanks DOC. Try the "Downhill – Upper Link - Horsetrack" loop.

Trapping. Numbers of pests have been low this summer with a few possums and rats. It is hoped this reflects the effectiveness of the trapping regime but monitoring will be done to confirm that. A big concern is the potential for new pests accessing Whareroa from further north, using the Expressway plantings as their own Expressway. Nga Manu in Waikanae have trapped several ferrets recently, these are new to Kapiti and a particularly nasty predator.

Orchard



All the trees have established. They were pruned by Liffet under the guidance of Cree Hatfield. The fruit was culled as as to encourage strong growth. Things look hopeful and it is planned to plant more this winter.

In the Dell

Releasing last year's school plantings and continuing weed clearance of the valley floor of the Upper Dell. There's a bit of gorse and inkweed. We aim to plant the valley floor with masses of flax with a few more swamp trees – pukeatea, ti kouka and nikau. Seeds have been gathered from Whareroa flax. We'll also push back encroaching gorse/inkweed on the valley sides above the track – trees are getting established. Please bring hand saws and loppers to remove gorse and grubbers to tackle weeds and small gorse plants. Wear good gloves and footwear and follow the flags. Remember sunhat and screen.

Last session 03 January - Ramaroa Wetland



The Picnic table donated by Kapiti Joggers and Walkers from their 2018 "In the Footsteps of the Marines" run has found its resting place, quite close to the Marines' Reservoir with a nice view over the Marines' camp site and across QEP to Kapiti Island. This flat area is set aside for a future "commemorative planting" site. The group chipped away at weeds around the new plants, especially gorse. The totara trees along the ridge are establishing well despite the dry conditions.

Theo and Ann explored a route for a walking track to connect the Reservoir to Ramaroa Stream. This will require some surveying (Ian) and earthworks in a future working bee.

Donation received from Lion Foundation

We applied to Lion Foundation for money for this year's plants to start the Upper Ti Kouka restoration. We have received \$6,000; this will purchase 1,500 plants. An ordering list is being compiled. Many thanks to the Foundation. Their local hostelry is The Boundary in Raumati Beach.

Volunteer Input 2018

In 2018 164 volunteers participated and donated 3779 recorded hours (worth over \$75,000 at \$20 per hour). 150 school children also planted trees. We know that your activities are often not recorded so this is an underestimate. This does not include the Kapiti Mountain Bike Club's work. This is a HUGE contribution to the reserve and reflects how strong is the community's attachment to Whareroa. **Thank you, thank you to all!**

Blackberry

Liffet reports that the Wednesday Weeders are unable to keep on top of blackberry threatening our restoration plantings and reserve biodiversity – especially in the lower Ramaroa Valley and by Matai Bush and Upper Bush. We have put in an application to the DOC Conservation Fund for professional assistance otherwise blackberry will just spread and cause huge degradation to the reserve. The Weeders and our working bees have succeeded in controlling it in some locations but only with huge effort. We are aware that there are also problem areas along Emerald Glen Road but will concentrate on the key ecosystems in the Reserve first.

Annual Report from the Chair

Trees planted

Our Trustees, Volunteers and Supporters

The last 12 months has seen significant progress at Whareroa largely through the efforts of our trustees, volunteers and supporters. I take this opportunity to sincerely thank all these individuals for their contribution over this period. Without this enthusiastic group of unpaid people no progress would be achieved. As a measurement of our statutory reporting for charitable status the following key performance indicators have been achieved:-

Our Stakeholders

DOC

- Our relationship with DOC at the Kapiti-Wellington office is strong. We have regular contact with our DOC relationship manager Suzi Tuffin who has our interests at heart and also with seniors Robert Ashe and Jack Mace. We have a raft of capital projects lodged with DOC and the associated business cases are in varying stages of progress. These include:
- Update the main maps in visitor centre and at the Hub.
- Getting a larger culvert on the farm race Darlington Drilling plans now with DOC engineers for review work in progress
- Bridge at end of Forest Loop walk work in progress
- Transmission Gully Mitigation for Upper Ramaroa Stream work in progress
- Farm Erosion Mitigation proposal from Trustees has been reviewed by DOC, GWRC &
 Beetham Pastural agreement reached for GWRC to draw up a 5 year pole planting plan for
 consideration by all parties
- CCTV in car park work in progress
- Historic bid to tidy reservoir work in progress
- Counters for Whareroa bike counters installed awaiting people counters

- Solution for damaged Farm entrance wall We heard today that Sascha Wassong and Simon Fern who coordinated the initial build have offered their services pro-bono to repair it, with volunteer support (expected to take 3 Saturdays in June). DOC will contribute to materials.
- DOC / Toyota Kiwi Guardians trail at Whareroa was completed and is on line.
- Our 10 year Farm Plan has been reviewed and a draft submitted to DOC for their approval.

Beetham Pastural

 Beetham Pastural are the lessee of farmed land at Whareroa and QE Park. We have regular contact with Farm manager Drew Brown and 6 monthly meetings with William Beetham.

GWRC

• The Whareroa Guardians participate in a bi-monthly Whareroa Collaboration Group chaired by GWRC. The purpose of this group is to work closely together to develop biodiversity and recreational activities across Whareroa Farm and QE Park

Kapiti Mountain Bike Club (KMC)

• Mountain biking at Whareroa attracts a large number of riders. The Red Tape track was officially opened earlier this year and the Club have resource consent to build two more downhill tracks in the same general area.

Kapiti Biodiversity Project

• Funding for this project is all but exhausted. Discussions continue regarding a District wide application approach for addition biodiversity funding. The group are forming an incorporated society to facilitate grant applications. Whareroa Guardians support this.

Other Activities:

Kiwi Caravan

- The Kiwi Caravan was officially opened in June 2018. The opening was attended by over 50 supporters. Our major supporters included:
- Kapiti MENZ Shed renovation of caravan
- DOC engineering design sign-off and grant towards cost of foundation
- AD Architecture advice on foundation construction
- Duncan Construction foundation layout
- MPP Alliance funding transportation
- Allan Shaw Carrying Ltd transportation
- Wellington Community Trust \$1,500 grant for mural
- Julie Oliver mural design and painting
- Our volunteers who erected piles, fixed the caravan to supports and built the smart bench as well as coordinated the project and hosted the artists.

Upper Ti Kouka Stream

• In December 2018 funding was approved by DOC to fence and retire 3.5 hectares of leased land surrounding the Upper Ti Kouka stream This means all waterways on the retired section of the Farm will be fenced and will be nurtured by riparian planting.

Signs

- A Bird Sign next to the Kiwi Caravan was donated by an anonymous donor
- A donation was received from Pakeke Lions Kapiti to erect a Lizard sign next to the Bird Sign

Lizard Relocation

• The Guardians are working with DOC and Nga Uruora to establish the Cairn as a site for lizard relocation from development projects. This will involve planting and bringing in wood and stones to prepare suitable habitat.

Special donation

 When supporter Dave Barber died last year he asked that donations be made to the Whareroa Guardians. About \$6000 was received and a picnic table erected in Upper Ramaroa Wetland in his memory. This is gratefully acknowledged.

In the Footsteps of the Marines Run

• Thanks to Kapiti Joggers & Walkers for donation of \$600

Plant a Billion Trees

 The Trustees are investigating whether we are eligible for funding under this Regional Development Scheme. This could potentially support mass planting on Whareroa retired land – the scope of which would exceed all our volunteer capacity. Early days on this project.

Next 12 Months

- Planting This year our focus is planting the Upper Ti Kouka stream area potentially a 3 year project. \$6,000 grant for 1500 plants from the Lion Foundation has been received.
- Blackberry Control Infestations of blackberry are threatening to invade sections of our planting plus natural bush segments. An application has been lodged with DOC Community Fund to sponsor a contractor to spray the blackberry over a three year period.
- Update Information Centre We will update our information display in the visitor entrance.
- New Track from Marines' Water Reservoir to Ramaroa Steam planning to finish this track within the next 6 months.
- Update Track Maps including Walking & MTB Tracks in liaison with DOC GPS mapping to create new maps.
- Work with KCDC on Open Spaces Strategy the Trustees have attended an initial workshop sponsored by KCDC to collaborate on the development of Kapiti's open spaces
- Erosion Control work with DOC, GWRC & Beethams on a pole planting programme

Update 02 May 2019

Next working bee: Sunday 05 May: 9 to noon with morning tea

Up at the Cairn and Ramaroa Wetland. The forecast looks good. Please bring hand saws and loppers to remove gorse and grubbers to tackle weeds and small gorse plants. A stile needs to be made so we can lock the gate into the Lizard site to ensure no stock get in. The last sections of fence wire need rolling up. If there is time, we'd like to release the totara on the ridge in Ramaroa Wetland. Wear good gloves and footwear and follow the flags.

Upper Ti Kouka Fencing and Planting





The elegant fence is now finished and includes all the headwaters of this stream. Brian Jones and his team did a great job; Theo liaised with them and DOC funded the job. Many thanks to all involved.

Planting will focus on the most vulnerable areas – the headwaters and areas of unstable ground where slips and erosion have occurred. Some spot spraying has already been done in preparation for planting. The gorse will generally be left to act as a nursery plant but along the track we aim to have a native boundary as well as planting scattered groups of trees higher up to provide seed sources. Thistles and inkweed will be a problem until ground cover occurs.

Last session 07 April - At the Cairn

A good session clearing weeds around the "face" and removing fencing. The grass was mown – stock will no longer be present so the flat area round the Cairn will need to be mown from now on. A select group worked hard. This report from Dawn: "Seven of us: Theo, Bruce, Richard, Tom, Ellen, me and Sandra with morning tea. Great progress on removing gorse from cairn cliff face, Theo and Tom hanging in there like mountain goats. Only a couple of gorse bushes left now but we were all a bit stuffed by 12 o'clock. Bruce removed some more fence and Richard mowed around the Cairn and all in all we were happy with the morning's work." The area is almost already for some more lizard friendly planting this winter. Pest Report from Shane Cave

Trapping has continued on. To date, 829 possums, 165 mustelids and 2,100 rats have been caught as well as many other pests. There is nothing remarkable to report other than to thank our assiduous trappers, John Rowland, Darrel Sutherland, Jason Bohmer, Shane Williamson, Rodney Hopkirk and Scott Hill (who returned from Switzerland over the summer to kill possums at Whareroa - to the mystification of his Swiss friends). We are slightly mystified at the preferences of the creep / creeps who recently broke into the Whareroa shed and stole stuff, including a half-full bucket of the blue scented lure we use for rodents, possums and hedgehogs. Unlike the late-night visitors our blugu isn't toxic. DoC immediately gave us a new supply - thanks.

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Update 13 June 2019

Planting: Sunday 16 June: 9 to noon with morning tea, hotdog after.

Another planting season is upon us. This will be the most challenging yet as we will start at the Ti Kouka headwaters, quite high up the valley. Spots are showing well so the grass is well dead. 1000 plants were delivered up to the planting sites a few days ago. The shortest access walk is to park at the Hub or along the farm race and walk up the western side of Ti Kouka Stream, under the big pines. Close gates if driving in. If walking from the carpark, go along farm race to Ti Kouka stile. Follow the flags. Morning tea will be brought up to us in LUV. With this area of riparian planting, all the significant streams in the retired section of Whareroa will be regenerating.

The site is exposed and steep in places so wear warm clothes and boots. Lower down the hill, later in the season, conditions will be easier. Hot dog after planting back at the shed (and see item later).

Wall Repair has started



The Whareroa Wall is rising from the rubble – many thanks to stone masons Sascha Wassong and Simon Fern with volunteers Ian Redward, Shane Williamson, Luke Brazier, Ruby Durrant-Bush, Chris Barriball, John Wilson & Bruce Bulmer; Dawn Bush & Penny Redward provided nourishment. Day one saw planning and layout and partial rebuilding. Work had to stop as the wet concrete would not support more rocks. All being well, it will be completed this Saturday.

Last working bee, 02 May- in the Dell

A horrible cold, wet start saw 12 hardy volunteers keen to get stuck in to ink weed and release new plants. Seven nikau, grown from Whareroa seed by Nicola and Al were planted, in the upper Dell. The sun came out and we then had a beautiful morning. Lots of last year's school plantings were released. They are doing well. Bernard continued with his loop track.



Richard brought along some giant carpet squares – these were placed in the orchard to kill grass prior to seven more fruit trees going into the ground. He also changed the carpet in the caravan.

We treated ouselves to a trip into the base of Kamahi Bush to check out kohekohe flowering and seeding. The regeneration on the ground is amazing – masses of small nikau, pigeon wood, titoki and others. The seeds will have been brought in by birds as there are no nikau in this area. Fungi were also colourful.


Last planting bee, 21 July - Upper Ti Kouka



NZTA and a Commercial Vehicle Safety Centre at Whareroa

NZTA have plans to place a CVSC weigh station on Whareroa land at the south end of Emerald Glen Rd. Their new system weighs trucks as they are driving along the highway and only those not complying will be called off. This site would be able to monitor all traffic going in both directions. Local residents are objecting to its placement with concerns over safety and long term change to the environment. Two meetings have been held with NZTA. Public consultation will happen in February.

If it goes ahead, the Guardians have advocated to NZTA for the maximisation of safety for recreational users and protection of the environment especially waterways.

Alarms Do not open the Guardians' shed unless you have the alarm code. It makes a very loud noise. Contact Ann 021 162 3559 **BEFORE** you open the door please.



Upcoming works on the Mackays Interchange with Transmission Gully



We're about to start work on local tie ins to the new interchange that will connect Mackays Crossing and the local coast road with Transmission Gully. Construction of this new interchange requires working on the current northbound offramp at Mackays Crossing. To complete these works safely and with minimum disruption to local residents and amenity users, the works are being undertaken in a staged approach but will involve periods of disruption to local residents, Queen Elizabeth Park users, Whareroa Farm users and some northbound SH1 traffic.

From the week starting 20 November 2019 to early January 2020 you will experience intermittent Stop/Go traffic management and shoulder closures at the end of the northbound offramp at Mackays crossing.

From 6 January 2020 for 2-4 weeks (weather dependant) the northbound off ramp at Mackays crossing will be closed to all traffic. Northbound access to QE11 Park, Whareroa Farm, Emerald Glen Road, Waterfall Road, Valley Road and Maungakotukutuku Road will be diverted to Poplar Avenue to turn around, head south on SH1 to the southbound Mackays off-ramp and under the overbridge to Queen Elizabeth Park or straight ahead to Whareroa Farm and local road connections.

There will also be no pedestrian or equestrian path or safe access under the bridge between Whareroa and Queen Elizabeth Park from 6 Jan and this extends throughout the works until late March 2020. Pedestrians and members of the equestrian community will be advised to travel and park on the side they wish to use rather than walk or ride between, and to allow extra time for travelling with horse trailers.

We appreciate this diversion presents a significant disruption to residents and are raising the plans with you early so that you can contact us to discuss any concerns. 






How the interchange will work when Transmission Gully is open to traffic **Mackays Crossing**
