DOC Community Fund grant

We can also now announce that we were successful in obtaining a grant of \$15,000 over three years for blackberry control where it threatens native bush and restoration. NgaUruora Contracting are carrying out this work and you can already see areas of cut and dead blackberry especially near Upper Bush, the upper Whareroa Stream & along the Ramaroa Stream. 


Update 30 January 2020

They have some new more effective traps, but the bad news is that a ferret has been caught at Whareroa. These are even worse bird killers than stoats and weasels and have been migrating south along the expressway lands. Vet Sue Blaikie does post-mortems when possible and is gathering valuable data about the mustelid population and what they have been eating.





Whareroa Hut and Wellington Festival

"Like the idea of combining nature with art? You'll feel like a kid again as you lace up your boots and head off with the whānau in search of miniature huts hidden in urban reserves and beaches, full of stories and imagination.

Inspired by huts of rural and alpine Aotearoa, this collection of handcrafted structures await discovery along the Kāpiti Coast, from Paekākāriki to Ōtaki.

Writers Mandy Hager, Apirana Taylor, Chris Maclean and Renée have gifted each hut with its own short story.

Kāpiti Coast huts are located a short walk from carparking and railway stations and are in natural environments such as beaches and bush trails. Locating the huts may require navigating uneven terrain off track. Within the collection there are journeys suited to most moods and abilities, however wheelchair access cannot be guaranteed for all huts. Campbell's Mill Rd

A mountain biker alerted us to a concerning new sign across Campbell's Mill Rd (CMR) at the entrance to Wainui Station saying the track is closed. CMR walkway/cycleway/bridleway is administered by Kapiti Coast District Council. Liffet & Ann headed off on the LUV to check it out. See pics below. Investigation shows that there will be logging occurring over the next 1-2 year and that the road may need to be closed at times but there is NOT a blanket closure of CMR across Wainui Station. This is a public right of way. We assume KCDC and GW will sort this out.

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Update 27 April 2020

Lockdown changes to Level 3 tonight.

Sadly we still cannot volunteer at Whareroa.

Alert Level 3: What it means for DOC visitors

DOC facilities and tracks

DOC huts, campgrounds and lodges will be closed and you should not undertake overnight activities.

You are still encouraged to spend time in nature. Local conservation areas, and tracks may be used providing:

- · it's for low-risk activities
- · 2-metre distancing is maintained
- · personal contact is limited to your bubble
- · activities are limited to a maximum of 3 hours, and
- any associated travel is kept local.

DOC toilets remain closed and should not be used (unless unavoidable, i.e. poo in a loo) and people should take all litter home with them.

You should not undertake higher-risk or motorised recreation activities (such as hunting, boating or four-wheel driving) in public conservation areas.

DOC will respond to any issues on public conservation land on a case by case basis and may close specific sites if needed.

For places to remain open and to ensure public safety, people must stick to the Government's guidelines outdoors, keep travel to a minimum and plan activities to avoid the need to use public bins and toilets.

New Map for Information Bay

Update 28 May 2020

No working bee for June. AGM will be held soon, waiting on library meeting room date confirmation

Planting is planned to start on Sunday July 5th

Depending on the level of Covid-19 control at that time there are likely to be changes in how we manage working bees; we will give detail nearer the time.

Planting 2020 will complete Upper Ti Kouka and extend plantings by the Cairn and in Upper Dell. Last year's plants are looking excellent in Upper Ti Kouka but less good around the Cairn where hares and rabbits and occasional farm animal have chewed plants down – but quite a lot are looking fine.



Lizard friendly plants near the Cairn; this year we will plant just below the rim so that access for monitoring and releasing will be easier.

Trees that Count is the main plant donor, giving us 1500 plants this year; in addition, Barefoot Sport (who run X-Terra) have donated \$400 for plants. Many thanks to these organisations.

Closure of Wainui Station for logging – no access along Campbell's Mill Rd to south of Whareroa for about 2 years.

As previously mentioned in this Update, there is a problem with access along Campbell's Mill Rd through Wainui Station. Unfortunately, the line of the formed "road" does not follow the Crown Land designation; in several places the formed road crosses Wainui Station land. There will be logging of the pine forests, expected to take 2 years. This carries significant hazard with heavy trucks and machinery who might not see a person on foot or a bike. *Access to Wainui Station is no longer permitted until logging has finished.* New red signs have been erected at the entrance to Whareroa, and at the end of Maungakotukutuku Rd and at the entrance to Wainui Station.

The Guardians have explored legal implications with KCDC and Walking Access Actearoa. Both understand the huge impact this will have on recreational users, particularly bikers, runners and trampers. The best that can be offered is that if logging operations cease for a while, then KCDC will change the Access Closed signs to allow access for that time. If the "Wainui Station Closed" signs are displayed, please do not proceed past the entrance to Wainui Station at boundary of Whareroa.

Lizards. Trustee Bruce Bulmer has accepted responsibility for liaising with DOC about lizard introduction. We will continue developing a suitable environment for lizards around the Cairn. Good news is that DOC is arranging to repair the damaged fence which has allowed stock to break into this area.

Houdini sheep. There are a couple of lambs who seem to be able to pass through fences, appearing on the wrong side a day after they were shepherded back through the gate. Investigation showed that they escaped from one paddock by squeezing through under a stile, they also managed to get into the Ti Kouka plantings and out by the visitor centre!

Milk trees (Streblus spp) flower for the first time



This group of trees, between Kohekohe Bush and the Gums were donated by Otari, with a view to developing a seed source for propagation.

New Sign for Information Bay

This is being actively developed by DOC and we hope will emerge before long, much has changed since the first one was prepared in 2011. Geographix have prepared a new map showing the current tracks. It was decided to rename the "Downhill Track" as "Five Ways Track" as the original name caused confusion. NB Walkers need to be aware that bikers may descend this track quite fast but the bikers must be able to stop if other users are met! Go to Nature Space to download the new map.

Update 14 June 2020

AGM 7pm Monday June 22nd Paraparaumu Library Meeting Room

All supporters are invited to our 13th AGM. Our guest speakers will be Peter Handford and Keith Johnston from Paekakariki who will discuss the exciting proposals to manage the surplus Transmission Gully land to benefit the community; "Wainuiwhenua". This is highly relevant to Whareroa as it could lead to a much larger area of reserve, restoration and pest control for South Kapiti as well as other social gains.

Three trustees' terms expire: Liffet Stewart, Sue Blaikie and Treasurer Lynette Francis who took over from Michael Keith last year. All three are willing to stand again. If there are other candidates, a secret ballot will be held at the meeting.

Planting is planned to start on Sunday July 5th

Under Level 1, we will be able to manage planting as usual with morning tea and BBQ after. If there are changes in Level that would have to be re-addressed. Of course we all hope there won't be. We will have about 1,800 plants to plant, starting at Upper Ti Kouka to complete the work of last year.

More "spots" for planting have been sprayed. Foundations for the "Old Dunny" should be done this month, Theo is coordinating this.
